# Presentation types

Oral Presentation	Poster Tour	Poster View
<p>Oral Presentations are set talks in which the presenter is given the stage to discuss their work with the entire audience who attends a particular session.</p>	<p>Poster Tours are Poster Presentations where a small audience is taken from poster to poster and the presenter formally presents their poster.</p>	<p>Poster View Presentations are the 'classic' conference poster presentation: the author stands by their work for the entirety of the session and discusses their work with other delegates who attend the session</p>
<p>Time allocated for Oral Presentations: 7 mins presentation and 3 mins for questions</p>	<p>Time allocated for Poster Tours: 4 mins poster presentation + 2 mins for questions</p>	<p>Time allocated for Poster Views: No set presentation. Author stands by their work for the whole session.</p>

# Presentation types

## Poster View

Poster View Presentations are the 'classic' conference poster presentation: the author stands by their work for the entirety of the session and discusses their work with other delegates who attend the session

Time allocated for Poster Views:  
No set presentation. Author stands by their work for the whole session.

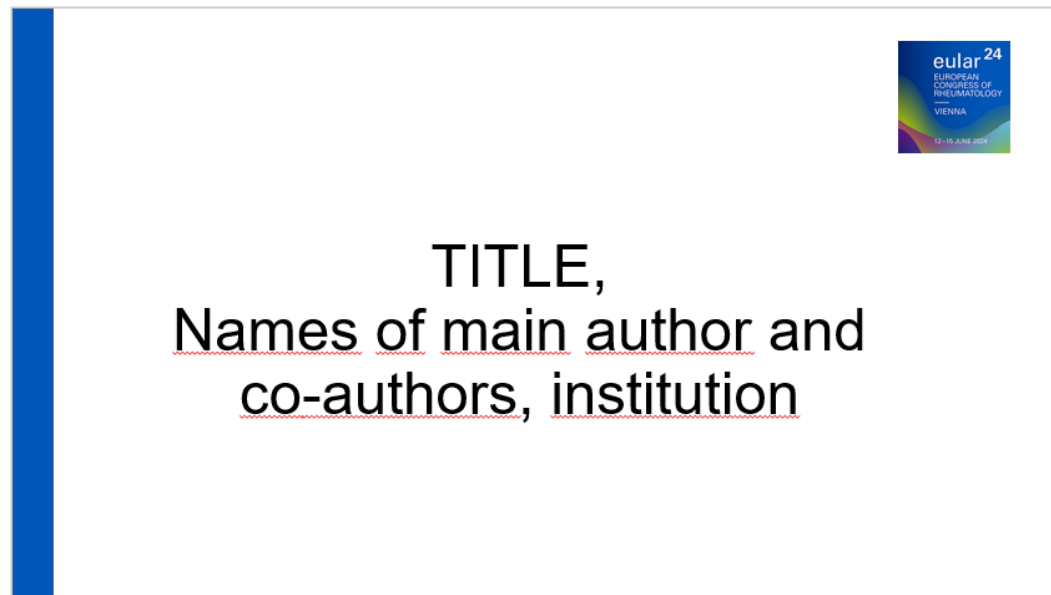

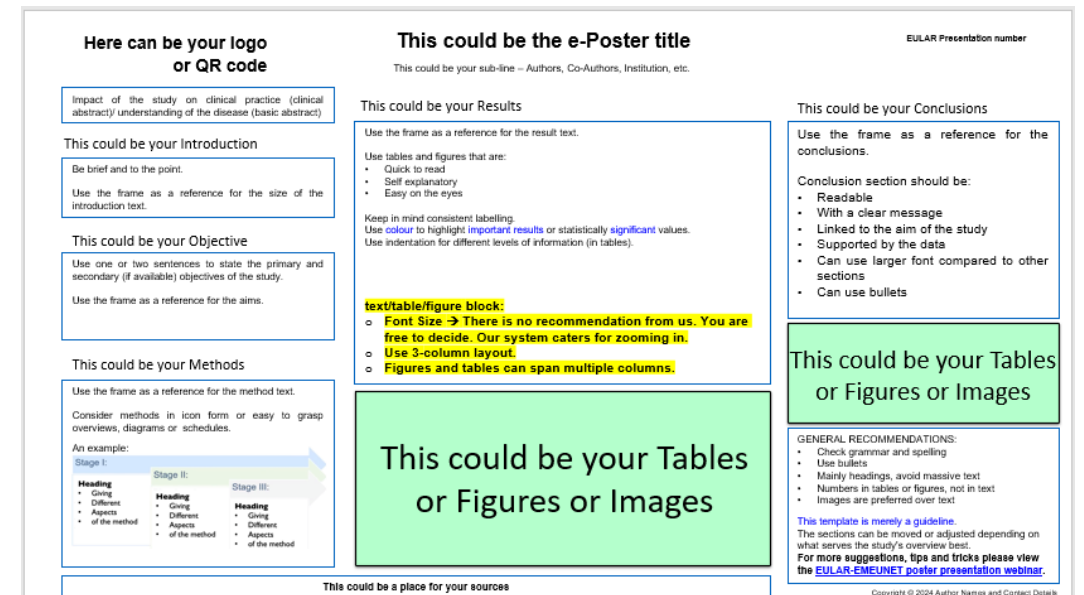
## Oral Presentation Template (first slide)

## Poster Presentation Template



**Here can be your logo or QR code**

**This could be the e-Poster title**  
This could be your sub-line – Authors, Co-Authors, Institution, etc.

**EULAR Presentation number**

**This could be your Introduction**  
Be brief and to the point.  
Use the frame as a reference for the size of the introduction text.

**This could be your Objective**  
Use one or two sentences to state the primary and secondary (if available) objectives of the study.  
Use the frame as a reference for the aims.

**This could be your Methods**  
Use the frame as a reference for the method text.  
Consider methods in icon form or easy to grasp overviews, diagrams or schedules.  
An example:  
Stage I: → Stage II: → Stage III: →

**This could be your Results**  
Use the frame as a reference for the result text.  
Use tables and figures that are:  
• Quick to read  
• Self explanatory  
• Easy on the eyes  
Keep in mind consistent labelling.  
Use colour to highlight important results or statistically significant values.  
Use indentation for different levels of information (in tables).  
**text/table/figure block:**  
o Font Size → There is no recommendation from us. You are free to decide. Our system caters for zooming in.  
o Use 3-column layout.  
o Figures and tables can span multiple columns.

**This could be your Conclusions**  
Use the frame as a reference for the conclusions.  
Conclusion section should be:  
• Readable  
• With a clear message  
• Linked to the aim of the study  
• Supported by the data  
• Can use larger font compared to other sections  
• Can use bullets

**This could be your Tables or Figures or Images**

**GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS:**  
• Check grammar and spelling  
• Use bullets  
• Mainly headings, avoid massive text  
• Numbers in tables or figures, not in text  
• Images are preferred over text  
This template is merely a guideline.  
The sections can be moved or adjusted depending on what serves the study's overview best.

# How to structure your talk

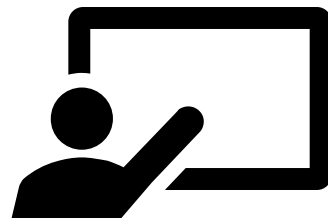


**New:** Impact of the study on clinical practice (clinical abstract)/  
understanding of the disease (basic abstract)



# Background

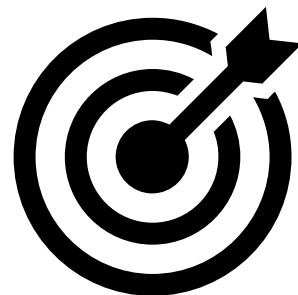
- The 'Background' section is very similar to the 'Introduction' of a scientific paper.
- Here you provide the **context of the research**, present the need for your research by demonstrating the **gap in evidence**, and serves as a way to get the audience's attention.
- You are presenting to an informed audience, so assume they understand the topic already and skip describing basic concepts: jump straight to the exciting bit of your research!



# Objective

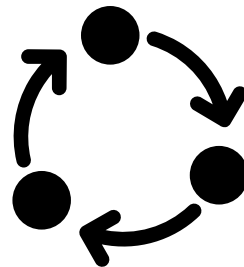
Simply put, the objective tells the audience what you were aiming to do with your research.

- What question were you looking to answer?
- What is the gap in the knowledge you were hoping to bridge?
- What is the *point* of your research?



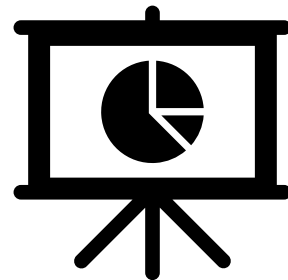
# Methods

- Explain your methods in enough detail so that the audience understands what you did to the point where they could feasibly design a replication study.
- The audience needs to understand the methods so they can understand the strengths and limitations of the research you have conducted
- Diagrams and pictures can be very useful in conveying the methods to your audience.



# Results

- Show your data using a method which is easy to interpret; table, diagram, charts etc. Do not repeat data in multiple figures.
- Avoid lengthy text.
- During your presentation, explain the findings in the tables and figures, pointing out any patterns. Offer interpretations and implications for your findings.



# Conclusion

- Conclude by drawing all other information together to finish ‘telling your story’.
- Link your conclusion back to your introduction. Your conclusion should help fill the gap that you identified in your Background section.
- Do not simply repeat your result section here: explain **how** your results fit into the context of the wider research.
- Use this as an opportunity to discuss what future research can be done as well as the limitations and strengths of your work.



# Impact

- Specifically highlight how your work impacts clinical practice or our understanding of the disease.
- **How will clinicians change their practice based on your results / what will researchers work on next, based on your results.**

- Introduce yourself to the Chair before the start of your session
- If you have a Poster View presentation, please ensure you are by your poster during your allotted slot.
- The inclusion of trade names/brand names are **not** allowed.
- Please use standard Windows PC font types and follow guidelines on making your presentation [accessible](#).

# Presentation Tips

DOs	DON'Ts
Plan the structure and tell the story of your research	Create text heavy slides which distract the audience
Font size at least 18, ideally between 20 and 30 for text	Just read off the slide or poster
A maximum of 7 bullet points per slide and use animations to highlight bullet points one at a time	Try to fit in more content in than you have time for.
Avoid capital letters only and strange formats	Don't overuse animations or 'busy' design features
Explain figures, use the cursor/pointer
